

Prayer Points Paschal Candle

The Paschal (Easter) Candle is the large, special candle which is the first candle to be lit at Easter, traditionally at the Vigil service late on Holy Saturday evening. The new fire and the lighting of the candle symbolise the triumph of the resurrection over the darkness of sin and death. We light the Paschal Candle from the fire at the Dawn Service (the first service of Easter). When the candle is lit, there is a joyous welcome to the Light of Christ at the Resurrection and the candle is blessed. A new candle is purchased each year. What makes the Paschal Candle special? It is large - ours is 24 inches tall, but they have come much larger!

idea of communication. Perhaps because I come off a report writing season, with comments written to summarise a Semester of adventures and learning and a strong focus on communication skills. Perhaps because many of our articles have that undertow. You are invited to think about how we share our faith in an intergenerational church. (One in Salisbury Cathedral UK was 11 metres tall!) On the candle are decorations. Central is a large cross. The year (2018) has one number in each corner made by the cross. The year signifies that God is present in the congregation. At the top of the candle is the Greek letter alpha, the first letter of the Greek alphabet; below the cross is omega, the last letter in the Greek alphabet. This is a reference to Revelation 1.8 and 22.13 where Jesus says'I am the alpha and the omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the ending.' At the Vigil service in Catholic and some Anglican churches, five grains of incense are inserted into the wax, representing the five wounds of Christ.

The Paschal Candle stands in a prominent position in the sanctuary forum, learning and strengthening our understanding of our neighbour. And when we are done with thinking and reflecting, how we can talk and share together.

Let this edition take you on a journey of wondering and encourage you to share with each other the ways in which God moves in your lives , each and every day.

and burns for the season of Easter, that is, from the first service of Easter to Pentecost. Then, technically, it is lit for baptisms and funerals, 'red days', like an induction service or the anniversary of the Uniting Church; it can stand by the coffin at a funeral service. The Paschal Candle signifies Resurrection, so it is alight before people come to worship. Its role is not to accompany the beginning of a church service.

However, some Uniting Church congregations like ours choose to light the Paschal Candle at services held throughout the year.

As you look at the Paschal Candle, think Resurrection! Christ triumphed over sin and death! Alleluia!

Individual Profile Muriel Burns

Muriel Bingham Burns was born in Shepparton at her midwife aunt's home in St Georges Rd in July 1919, the elder sister of brother Ron. Her family home was in Edwards St. She recalls a happy and carefree childhood!! The Rev Paul baptised Muriel and at 98 Muriel is not sure whether this occurred at home or at Scots Church.

She attended Scots Kindergarten and Scots Sunday School - and explained there were lots and lots of children. Anniversaries were a special highlight for Muriel with three services on the day to mark the occasion. Mrs McKinnon was her Sunday school teacher and Muriel was awarded a special prize (which she still has) for remembering all the books of the Bible.

Later on Muriel became a Sunday School teacher herself and loved working with the younger people. Her parents were keen Churchgoers and Muriel assured me that she has a strong faith and God has always been in her life. Her Dad lost his job when Muriel was quite young so the family moved to Wagga for work. Eventually they returned to Shepparton where Muriel's father worked at the cannery for thirtyseven years.

Muriel was married to Walter Burns at Scot's Church in 1945 and they became parents to Margaret in 1946 and Doug six years later. Muriel was a stay at home Mum but worked hard at making beautiful dresses and gained the reputation as a great dress maker, hotly sought after and a lovely honest person. Most of Muriel's friends came from Scot's church where over a very long period of time she was a choir member and performed in many memorable church concerts where many of the costumes were her creations!!

Muriel became involved in other church activities including UCAF and Crazy Whist, which she derives great enjoyment from. She has been involved in the Guiding Movement and is a founding member of the Shepparton Trelfall Guild, which she is still associated with. Muriel is also a very long standing member of CWA.

Muriel is indeed one of our Uniting Churches living treasures.!!!

Faith in Action Publishing On the Vine

December 2014 marked the start of a new adventure as On the Vine was born and available at the entries of Shepparton Uniting Church for the first time. A magazine aiming to merge together the stories of our congregation with the life of our wider church, to be shared with anyone who opened the cover.

To be honest, I don't really remember how it all came about in great detail - I just remember that it happened. The idea was formed, people approached to contribute, a name was chosen and people with gifts and skills came forward. On the Vine has always been steered by the Publicity committee and had the creative flair of Corey Jinnette to set it out and give it the incredible appearance and design you see today. Scope was set out to include a range of different areas: Faith in Action, Ecumenical or Interfaith Focus, Group Profile, Individual Profile, Reflecting on..., From the Minister, Kildonnan Uniting, Assembly Actions, Synod Snippets, Prayer Points as well as space to include the calendar and preaching plan. Before we knew it, On the Vine had been embraced by our church community and we now print 160 copies every edition.

Today, On the Vine is compiled and printed by the Publicity Committee - in main part, Melissa Graham and Jen Shields - who source the items you read today. This is through a great deal of shoulder tapping, promoting, searching online for articles of interest from within our church, as well as our regular contributors. This precedes countless hours of clicking, copying, pasting, rearranging, finding photos to match and spacing out the articles to fit the page - not to mention the reading, rereading and then sending it to John Hewitt to give the final proof edit, before printing. Because of the large workload, Jen and Mel alternate the magazine as much as possible as it's really a one person job at the computer. The biggest, most exciting part is printing - these days we have a new printer which collates and staples the magazine as it prints, but it still takes around four hours to print it all and needs to be supervised in case of a jam or error. Despite the large amount of work put into the magazine, it really is something we love doing. Our first editions were collated by hand and were always an exciting and social night, with people popping by to join in the production line and chat.

One of the most amazing parts of On the Vine has been hearing stories of how people come across it.



A handful of people received On the Vine via email as a way to keep in touch with Shepparton Uniting Church as they have moved away (if you would like to receive On the Vine via email, please let us know!). Others use it as a Pastoral Care aid, taking it to those who can no longer make it to church, helping people feel connected with our community. For others, they collect it on a regular Sunday and leave it on their coffee table for visitors to read. Then there are some who collect it when they come into the church for a midweek visit, who may not be connected to our Sunday morning service but are still connected to the wider life of our church. This is Faith in Action.

This edition is not the normal quarterly edition you may have become used to. Due to the large amount of work required to keep On the Vine coming, the decision has been made to cut it back to every four months. This is where you come in. We need help to find the information you find interesting. To feature the stories of the things that happen in our wider church community. We have some regular contributors, to whom we are very thankful, but we are always looking for more. Just because an article may not suit the tone of one edition, does not mean it won't suit the next. Ecumenical Action Indonesian Interfaith Visit

On May 4, the two Indonesian Interfaith Visitors, Cicilia and Haqqi, who spent a week with us in March, flew home to Java. Their Shepparton hosts, Shirley and Vern Marven, Elaine Brewster and Loni and family and I had numerous email chats with them in their last week in Wodonga. They have greatly enjoyed their time in Wodonga, and sharing with us was a highlight.

Indonesia is the world's largest Muslim country. Christians are a very small minority, but are one of the six religions approved to worship. The PERCIK Institute is in Salatiga, Central Java where there are many more Christians -20% of the population. Ruci Dewi attended the Christian University there! PERCIK'S main research area is in helping people of these six religions to live together harmoniously. During their Shepparton visit, Haggi explained what it was like to suddenly become part of a minority because of his faith. He delighted in the mosques and Muslim contacts here - there are none in Albury-Wodonga, although his hosts took him to an Albury Islamic group for Friday prayers. On the other hand, Cicilia equally suddenly became part of a religious majority and greatly enjoyed that experience, as her report to St Stephen's Wodonga indicates. Haggi was very moved by sharing in the 'full Easter' - Holy Week, Good Friday and Easter, as these Interfaith Visitors do everything together.

Cicilia has sent me the presentation she made to Wodonga TAFE and also details about her work with the PERCIK Institute. She works in the Conflict- Religious Relationships area. The other part of her work is with SOBAT, with women and children. Her report to St Stephen's Church includes a couple of pages about Shepparton, its multicultural life and Interfaith Network as well as their experiences here. I have shared these reports with those who hosted our guests. Others who would like them should contact me.

One of the things which greatly impressed me was that Cicilia's husband, who is often away with his work with the Institute, ensured that Cicilia also had the opportunity to travel, while he cared for their three sons.

We look forward to St Stephen's next Interfaith visit from PERCIK!

Presbytery Points Field Days: Telling our Story

About eight years ago, the presbytery co-hosted Wisdom's Feast with the Centre for Theology and Ministry. We, the Mission and Education Committee, offered to host it the following year but, being told others must share, we decided to run our NEV version, Field Days. Since then, we have run Field Days a number of times as well as co-hosting Wisdom's Feast again in 2017.

Field Days 2018, Telling Our Story, was held June 1-2 at Shepparton Uniting Church. Friday evening began as we gathered with drinks and platters of nibbles and much animated conversation as people met those from many parts of the presbytery. Following a wonderful roast meal, our guest the Revd Dr Sunny Chen (Melbourne University and the CTM) enthralled us with part one of Telling a Wedding Story: The Departure. Not what we were expecting, but breathtaking! Then we talked it over while enjoying Janette Smith's delectable desserts.

On Saturday Sunny continued, with worship and Telling a Wedding Story 2: The Reunion. For some, this was even more captivating than Part 1! After morning tea, we worked on The Wall of Wonder, led by Mission and Education Committee Chairperson, Brian Spencer, Waranga minister. Armed with a book of Post-Its, we each added stickers to name significant events for the world, Australia, the local community and the church for each decade in the last 50 years. Then we explored their significance and their effect on us and our faith journey.

Field Days Saturday afternoon is always two sessions of workshops. In the first session, we discovered the Indigenous story through the Aboriginal Street Art Project, Bobby Nicholls, nephew of the late Sir Doug Nicholls, telling the stories of the five people celebrated in street art and sculpture. (The project had won a HART Award the previous night.) Jen and Cam Shields presented a workshop on The Sonder Collective and Presbytery Minister Mission and **Education Jeanne Beale explored** the role of Powerpoint in telling the story. The second series included Jeanne matching presentation on Facebook. Christina Rowntree, from the CTM, explored story-telling especially in relation to the Street

Art Walk. Emmanuel and Joan told the Congolese story - did you know Emmanuel was only 14 when his mother sent him alone, without money, from Congo to find a safer country to live in?

We had fewer participants this time less than half the usual number - but some found the numbers even better for sharing. It was a joy to welcome members of this congregation to their first Field Days, as participants and three as presenters. The committee, Brian Spencer, Joan McRae, Lorraine Threlfall, Janette Smith and Jeanne Beale thank Shepparton for their hospitality, and especially the Catering Committee for afternoon tea - and look forward to welcoming more from this congregation next Field Days!

"We offer these prayers to you recognising that there will be many words flooding over us all as we prepare for this journey together," said Dr Palmer.

"Each prayer equips us with space, silence and action we need to contemplate the 15th Triennium's theme Abundant Grace, Liberating Hope."

We will pray together for renewal for ourselves, our communities, our world and our Church.

<u>Prayer 1:</u> We journey together towards our Assembly. We give thanks for God's abundant grace and we are set free with the liberating hope of Jesus. Today, take a moment to think about your journey in the UCA. When did it begin? Where has it taken you? What keeps you present?

<u>Prayer 2:</u> Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. 1 Corinthians 12:27

Stand as you are, in your body. Breathe. Know that you are part of a great body of hope journeying together towards Assembly. Know that you are connected. Breathe.

Prayer 3: Commit today to taking a carbon fast as you journey towards Assembly whatever is possible in your life - driving less, eating less or no meat and walking more.

Prayer 4: You shall also love the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt. Deuteronomy 10:19

The Dalai Lama says:

"This is my simple religion. There is no need for temples; no need for complicated philosophy.""Our own brain, our own heart is our temple; the philosophy is kindness." Speak with kindness to a stranger today.

Prayer 12: ... truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; 2 Corinthians 6:7 Jesus spoke truth to power. This led to the cross.

Where does our Assembly and our church need to speak truth today?

Prayer 13: At its Greek root, "to believe" simply means "to give one's heart to." If we can determine what it is we give our heart to, then we will know what it is we believe. Today, can you give your heart to God?

Prayer 14: Thus the LORD used to speak to Moses face to face, as one speaks to a friend. Exodus 33:11 Go for a walk. Doesn't have to be a long one. Even around the block. Where is God on this walk? Pay attention. Can you speak to god as to a friend?

Prayer 15: "I not only live each endless day in grief, but live each day thinking about living each day in grief." C.S. Lewis. Today, allow yourself to grieve, really grieve. Grieve for those you have loved and lost, grieve for our planet, grieve, lament and rest.

At this Assembly we will be brave. We will not be afraid. And if we are afraid, we will look to each other and to our god and we will find our way forward, together.

Reflecting On... Intergenerational Relationships

Within the Uniting Church, much effort is being put into assisting youth to understand the heritage of Faith as of the gospel message that Jesus is the Christ now as at the beginning. Special activities appealing to youth are offered not so much as an inducement, but to establish a sense of belonging together. This is very commendable as is the opportunity given to meet with promininent people who offer inspiration.

It might be said that the older members of a congregation have had time to appreciate and give thanks for grace and enlightenment. If only that was a reality then that would be fine. Unfortunately it is too easy to become a habitual Christian going through the motions of worship and even sharing in activities together. Without question there are devoted members committed in all they do and in their daily lives offer prayers, consider the way of the Lord and are given to outreach to others. We do not ask of who is faithful; rather we should accept one another without question. Supporting and giving acknowledgement of one another is the very least that we can do.


The gap between youth and the older members of a congregation is significant. However, maybe that which is over-looked are the middle group of people between the ages of 40 to 55 years of age. This is an arbitrary figure that can vary. At this stage people are often offering by their employment the best years of their lives. Often both husband and wife are working and have teen-agers to educate. Come weekends and both parents desire timeout to recuperate: sometimes enjoy social life with friends. Some are more physical to visit the snow. Others enjoy a musical night out. And within the Australian culture a night at the Pub with some entertainment is the go.

This is far the biggest gap in any congregation. The question is how do we restore balance between generations? To be a community of faith there is a need for unity. This doesn't mean everybody being together at worship at the same time. Rather it is a matter of devoting a more equitable effort at meeting the needs of all groups. In some ways too much emphasis can be put on the word age. As people we are all different with our own personalities and gifts. It is better that we learn to accept one another and not put labels on ourselves as if we were goods for sale. The words "To love one another as I have loved you" need to be uppermost in our mind. More than surveys and questionnaires; something more genuine needs to take place. Friendship and hospitality: reaching out to visit one another we know are worthwhile.

To speak of renewal is a challenge to all of us at every stage of life. Let us work together and break the deadlock of inter-generational differences. The experts have fine words, but surely we can see for ourselves. Faith can move mountains.

Property Planning Task Group As of 8/5/2018

In February I noted that the vision of the Congregation had become reality: the Opening had been held on February 4. Since then, the Property Planning Task Group has enjoyed settling in to the new premises and helping to iron out the little problems associated with a new building.

Of these, the dishwasher has been a problem - water insufficiently hot, dishes not drying, water draining the wrong way and so on. The problems were addressed early in May: the operational ones proved to be from incorrect installation of the machine. A lipped bench has been installed to deal with drainage problems. The cisterns in the men's toilets have been lowered. Some of you will have noticed that one of the car park grates did not drain effectively after heavy rain. This problem has been reported.

And the chairs arrived April 24! Our warmest thanks to all who assisted

in clearing the church, unpacking the new chairs and arranging them.
