From the Minister's desk

Dear friends in Christ

In this edition of the 'Vine' I wish to share with you some thoughts on 'why we do what we do' as the people of God. It is hoped to shed some light in the ordinary things that we Christians do which are often taken for granted because we are used to doing them all the time. Having said that, I must state here that all the things we do, we do them in response to God's saving act in history, which was ultimately fulfilled in the Christ event. This saving act of God continues in and through His church in the power of the Holy Spirit.

My intention is to write a series of commentary on those things that we do, and one of those is, WORSHIP. It is fitting to begin with 'worship' because worship is at the centre of our being as a community of believers, and worship is the very thing we were created for, and to do. This means, that we are most the people of God in worship. It is our ongoing practice and experience of faith. It is how we, as people of God practice our reliance on our Lord. We come together in worship, we pray, we listen to God's word, we confess our sins, we make peace with each other, we lift up our hearts, we hold out our hands, we are fed, we give thanks, and we go forth.

It is in worship that we practice and live out the patterns of our life together before God, rehearsing every little bit until they become second nature to us. In the liturgy of the word, we are taught that the God who has been involved since time began is involved with us still. Through the liturgy of the Lord's Supper, we experience the incarnate Lord who feeds and forgives and calls us to follow him into the world. Through this encounter we understand what it means to be human, and enabled to live our lives into the fullness

of our heritage as sons and daughters of God.

We bring all of whom we are to worship. It is not only a spiritual experience; it is a physical one also. There are faces to be smiled at, hands to be touched, bread to be tasted, and wine to share. We stand when we could just as easily be sitting, sometimes we kneel, like troubadours, like lovers, like servants, we kneel before the Lord our Maker and our hearts follow. Then, we stand and sing, and we sit to listen, dancing the peculiar ballet of the people of God.

Our worship is the medium of our identity over time. Like a family album, our liturgy bears the marks of those who have gone before us-portraits of those we have never met, inscriptions written by many hands left for us by our ancestors in the faith.

Prayer points... Madas Youth Group: Prayer

As a youth group we have discussed what prayer means to us. What we found is that it is different for everyone. A common idea is that we pray when others say we should and read what someone else has written for us. However most people don't naturally connect to this and it puts people off prayer entirely. What we don't notice though, is that we pray all the time without even realising it.

Praying is whatever you want it to be. As Christians, we have the ability to pray by ourselves in quiet meditation, or we can experience prayer in a group through music or discussion. Also, we can connect with God without the formal restraints that we are typically brought up with. During our youth groups conversations, we uncovered that a few of us feel closest when we have little revelations and we send a tiny thank you to God, rather that hailing a few Marys.

When asked 'Why do we pray?', of course the first answers were 'why not?' and



'YOLO' (You Only Live Once), but once we got deeper, we came up with things like 'self need' and 'enlightenment'. Our youth group leader, Cameron Shields, told us that when he was looking for inspiration, he prayed for help and suddenly it got a lot easier. Sometimes we can't find the words, so it's better to just ask god to look in your heart for them.

Tom Sargent, one of the older members in our group, says that it is extremely important to acknowledge that you can pray "by yourself, with others and with others, by yourself". By this, he means that there are times when you should focus on your own, there are times when it's good for you to share your prayer with everyone who wants to listen, and sometimes you should be with others and make little personal prayers (especially when you are 'the random loner at the party').

So there are many different ways to pray but the main thing is that you find the way that works for the two of you.

Shepparton Uniting Church Redevelopment

We are happy to report significant progress. On June 26 the Shepparton City Council issued a Planning Permit for the project. It lists a number of conditions which are to be complied with before we can occupy the completed building. Such conditions are common for projects of this size.

Preparation of documents needed for the tender process is continuing. Our principal designer Peps Plans is organizing this process. Consultants engaged to prepare structural & hydraulic design have completed most of the work required. The audio- visual design work has commenced. Electrical & Mechanical services design work is to be obtained from local consultants. All of this design work is required as part of the tender process.

We would anticipate calling for tenders to construct the building before the end of October this year.

It is possible that some of the design consultants could rebate part of their design



fees if they are successful in obtaining work on the construction of project.

Travelling expenses for Synod Consultants have been reimbursed to our investment account.

The sale of St David's is scheduled to be finalised in early November. We have picked up a bit more money from Property Sale Proceeds than we had originally anticipated.

Part of the Business Case for the project was presented to the Presbytery Property Committee on July 30. We expect a favourable outcome from this presentation.

The full Business Case is to be presented to Synod Property Services when the tenders have been received. You can be assured that both Presbytery and Synod want to see this project proceed.

Thank you for your patience with our committee as we push to continue the redevelopment.

Getting To Know...

Arthur Willmott

Born: August 1933 at the Tocumwal Hospital NSW.

School and working life: Attending Tamleugh North Primary School life was pretty simple, no buses, pushbikes or being dropped off by car so Arthur rode a pony to school! The pony spent the day in the "pony/horse paddock" this being an essential inclusion in all country schools.

Arthurs secondary schooling was completed at Shepparton High School leaving after completing year 10 to begin work on the land doing anything and everything just as his father had done. With a great infinity for trucks tractors and all things mechanical it was no surprise that in 1954 Arthur was employed by the local bus company Taylforths. As well as doing a bit of everything Arthur was the driver for the Karramomous/ Caniambo school run, his childhood school run.

Through bus driving Arthur was the first to take a bus through the Snowy Mountains with students from Shepparton North Technical School; saw the installation of bus license through an "assessment", in the form of an interview with the local police officer; dropped off Melbourne Olympic torch runners on the Tatura – Rushworth leg of the relay for the Melbourne games in 1956. Arthur had to make sure the runners were in their positions to pass the torch on then he had to pick them up again and get them back to Tatura.

Arthur was involved with the Scouting Movement for over 30 years as a scout and district leader and later as an administrator for the movement.



Family Life: In 1961 at the Wesley Church in Shepparton Arthur married the love of his life Glenys Wisely and with the help of relatives built the comfortable home (adding to it as needed) he still lives in today. Sadly Glenys passed away in 2002. Arthur is the very proud father of four children – Kim, Peter, Jodie Christian and an extremely proud grandfather of nine grand children!

Faith Journey: Arthur has enjoyed a strong journey of faith throughout his life beginning with his baptism at St Alban's Anglican Church Tocumwal NSW.

Arthur attended the Baptist church at Karramomous he described this as an early example of a Community Church of all faiths!

Arthur worshipped at Kialla East Methodist in the sixties and was confirmed during these years at Mooroopna.

From 1961 until 2003 Arthur and Glenys worshipped at the Tallygaroopna Uniting Church and when that closed St David's Uniting Church Shepparton became his place of worship.

Arthur was not in favour of "our four churches coming together" but has embraced the change whole-heartedly and is our ever reliable, quiet and unobtrusive "go to man" for many aspects of worship at the Wesley site. Arthur is a member of Church Council and Elder of our Congregation .



Arthur has a deep and profound faith that was significantly developed and strengthened within his marriage and Glenys' influence as well influnces from Sunday School Teachers Anne and Hilda and the Reverend Rob Haley. This has given Arthur enormous gratitude and a firm belief as he commented, "that God has had something to do with a lot of things that have happened in my life."

Since his wife's passing Arthur has devoted more time and energy to be involved with church activities.

Interfaith News Indonesian Interfaith Visitors

The Revd Yanne Erika and Moh Akbar from Centra Java spent six days with us during their time in Australia as part of the Interfaith Programme of St Stephen's Uniting Church Wodonga.

Our warmest thanks to Alan English and to Rucci Dewi and Kim Stokie for offering hospitality to Yanne and Akbar.

At the Congregational Gathering on May 17, Yanne spoke about her experience as a minis-ter in the Protestant Church of Java. Previously she was a minister in a congregation; at present she runs the small boarding house for the day school run by her congregation. Akbar is a Muslim

human rights researcher who has published many books and papers. Both work for PERCIK, an interfaith organisation in Salatiga, Java. Also on May 17, Yanne and Akbar spoke at Mass at St Mel's and afterwards at an evening meal with that congregation and Shepparton Interfaith Network.

On May 18, Yanne and Akbar were guests for Shepparton Regional Reconciliation Group's visit to the Njernda Aboriginal Corporation at Echuca. There we saw the medical and legal centre, met some of the 100 indigenous staff and were entertained by several Aunties. The Corporation's

Berrima Child Care Centre which has 25 kinder and 25

child care places was of great interest as the house in which it began was a gift from the Uniting Church thirty years ago when church

property was divested and given to Indigenous communities. (29 Edwards Street Shepparton was another.) All staff are trained Aboriginal child care workers. At a visit to the TAFE College we met Aboriginal students in Art, Teaching, Child Care and Nursing courses. The return trip was through NSW and took in Cummeragunja and the Medical Co-operative there. Yanne and Akbar were

extremely interested to see these Aboriginal Co-operatives because their work with the Indigenous people in Java is a high priority for them.

On Tuesday, Rucci took Yanne

and Akbar to the Grammar School where they met students, visited Indonesian classes and conversed with students.

Yanne and Akbar also visited the Albanian and Turkish Mosques for Akbar to pray. They were hugely impressed to meet the People Helping People who provide free meals at the Lake each evening.

There was insufficient time to fit in all the planned activities. The final engagement for our visitors was the Presbytery meeting held at St David's, where they made presentations to the meeting and met members over lunch, before returning to Wodonga for their final week before their journey home to Java.

Assembly Actions

Hearts On Fire; Stories of Joy and Sorrow

Assembly I assumed it would be business stuff and regulations which it was but what I didn't expect was the human touch the stories of such joy and such sorrow and pain and the sense of the holy spirt been amongst us, it was with in this community the body of Christ that we were able to discern.

The bible reading for our daily study was Luke 24 13-35 we had it read to us each day in a different Language and the a different guest speaker would reflect on the reading, which I will paraphrase.

The story of two people traveling a road with heads so full and hearts so full of sorrow having had Jesus handed over by their Chief Priests and rulers and sentenced to death, they did not notice the stranger that had joined them was Jesus, and they only realised that it was Jesus once they shared a meal together.

In some ways parts of the Assembly were like this. We heard from the head Commissioner of the Roval Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse. As we sat and listened to the facts of the mistreatment of the victims, everyone in the room sat in such silence and focus to what was being said and as the body of Christ we all felt a deep sense of hurt that the victims bear. With heads so full and hearts so heavy it was hard to see where Jesus

was, yet he was there with us as we travelled the road and though this sense of hurt we as a church can show compassion and sharing and start to work with the victims in giving them justice they deserve.

The theme of the Assembly was hearts on fire- it only takes a spark to set the heart alight and for it to be the light in the dark. It was often over meals and drinks that we heard each other's stories and the road travelled together. It was where I meet such compassionate, loving people of Jesus all with different stories, some of joy and some of pain. It's these stories that have shaped my faith, people so passionate about making a change in the church and in the world though social justice; people with such burning heart full of passion. I have built lifelong friendships with these future leaders of the Uniting Church.

In the young leaders group were people from Congress and all different cultures. At the start of the week we decided as a group it was important to bring a proposal forward to the Assembly about the closure of indigenous communities. This was very well received by the Assembly. One part of the proposal was that the president of the UCA would meet with state premiers and the prime minster, the other was that as a group we





would take the opportunity to get a large group photo to be used in promoting the new proposal to the wider community to show the Uniting Church's support to keep communities open. Photo 2 whole Assembly

One off the hardest proposals that took the longest to work though was the marriage proposal, some points that were raised from the report had been that congress and multicultural communities need more time to talk and discuses same sex marriage in culturally sensitive ways. The other was to continue to look at how as a church we see ourselves in today's changing world and how our theology supports our views and understanding and how we interpret the bible.

For me personally, I had not thought all that deeply about the subject till assembly. I



found the biggest change came when I meet two ladies in the young leaders group who are both in same sex relationships. One of them who got married in a church in New Zealand, and just like Jen and I, they both have a strong focus on having God at the centre of their relationship which left me realising there is no big difference between our relationships.

So, over the next 3 years the task group will continue to work on the marriage discussions paper hearing both sides of the story and report to the 15th Assembly.

If there is one important thing I can take away from Assembly is that "love works". (photo 3) When we love our neighbour like Jesus loves us we can start to make a difference, when we invite the stranger in for supper that's when we see Jesus.

During the Assembly, the co-ordinator for multicultural ministry for the UCA Rev Emanuel, taught us a Aramaic word which is Marhaba which means God Is Love.

14th Assembly

The Triennial Assembly is a meeting of approximately 265 members of the Uniting Church in Australia. Members are elected by Synods and Presbyteries across the country. These elected members join with office holders, Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress members, youthful members and others to form a national decisionmaking body. Members of the Assembly meet for six days every three years in a different state or territory each time. The discussion centres on the direction and priorities of the Uniting Church in Australia for the next triennium. The outcome is a series of decisions that guide the life of the Church and its advocacy over the following three years.

In 2015 The Assembly was held at the University of Western Australia, Perth from the 12-18th July.

Hearts on Fire

Fire is a rich symbol for the First Peoples of Australia. If you are to enter another Clan/Nation's country you light a fire at the Nation's boundary to make your request to enter or pass through. Fire sticks are used to care for country and pass onto others. Indeed fire is a symbol for most indigenous cultures - the many different cultural and linguistically diverse peoples who are the hearts on file 14th Triennial Assembly Uniting Church in Australia

Uniting Church in Australia. Fire, burning, shining and hearts are all rich symbols used in Scripture. For me this also speaks of our hearts and passion - the kind of "fanning into flame" which Paul spoke of; the kind of fire that a church which is no longer at the 'centre' of Australian society, needs to have on the margins, at the edges, to be relevant, to act and to speak in this space. To be a Christian is to care for the marginalised and oppressed in our communities and in the world.

Reflecting On... Genesis

A Retreat for Church Council Members was held on Saturday 27th June at The "Business Edge Conference" meeting room in Toolamba.

Our facilitator was Geraldine Lemard, a retired minister with the Uniting Church based in Mulwala.

The day started with a cuppa, yummy nibbles and fellowship in front of a super wood heater which really set the atmosphere since it was a very cold day. We took time out for a hot lunch including Judy Luscombe's famous soup, a walk around a beautiful native garden before getting back into discussion. At the end of the day we served each other the bread and wine in Communion.

The following is a precise of my notes I took on the day.

Our study was of the first 11 chapters of Genesis. We looked at a precise version of these chapters. Chapters 1- 3: Creation, the Garden of Eden, and the fall of humanity from God's grace. Chapters 4 & 5: Adam & Eve's children, and their descendants. Chapters 6 - 8: The second creation story; the story of the flood as a result of utter chaos. Chapter 9: God's Covenant with Noah - the first Covenant. Chapter 10: Noah's descendants. Chapter 11: Tower of Babylon.

From this came the discussion - what it meant to us as Christians. It had nothing to do with the "big bang" theory, or "everything created in 6 days".

We talked about the nature of God, the plan of creation, made in God's image from the love of God. The creation was perfect. It was paradise.

But things got "mucked up"!

We talked about God's willingness to start again out

of LOVE.

The Genesis story is not about "how". It is a "given" by those who believe in God.

Regardless of what happens in the world today we need to hold onto the belief that God creates, and so it is a story of HOPE, that God will prevail no matter what!

God's creation of humanity-God breathes into the nostrils of humanity the breath of God. The breath of God is what He gives when entering into the chaos and breathing into something of himself.

Life- being in relationship with God. "Let there be light". The glory of God here in the chaos.

Footnote. We all enjoyed the journey of the day; the location, food, fellowship AND the opportunity to explore what it means to be God's people in today's world.

Yanyun LotipanYapenyeba: Walk and Talk Together

On Wednesday 24th June 2015 24 staff from Kildonan UnitingCare attended the Bangerang Cultural Centre for a Cultural Awareness Session facilitated by workers from the Yanyun Lotjpan Yapenyebak (Walk and Talk Together) Program. The session's purpose was a commitment developed through the organisation's Reconciliation Action Plan to have 85% of staff participate in Cultural Awareness Training. The facilitators spoke on topics that included Local History, Constitutional Recognition, Apology to Stolen Generation, 1967 Referendum, the Burnum Burnum declaration and about David Unaipon's life achievements. The group where shown various aboriginal artefacts that were used in the past for hunting and gathering food and given the history of the each item and how they were used. This UnitingCare Kildonan

was then followed with a tour of the Bangerang Cultural Centre which enhanced further understanding of the aboriginal culture.

This was a successful presentation, as participants stated that they learnt much more about the local history and current ongoing issues with in the nation.

Synod Snippets

A strategic review of UCA VicTas Synod

Following Christ, seeking community, compassion & justice for all creation

Over the past months you may have heard the words Major Strategic Review or simply the letters MSR, but what does it all mean?

"The May 2013 Synod resolved that the Synod Standing Committee (SSC) undertake a Major Strategic Review (MSR or Review) to advise the Church on its vision, plans and sustainability into the future.

The Review seeks to understand the purpose of the church in the 21st Century and the changed and changing nature, shape and theologies of the church 37 years on from the adoption of the Basis of Union.

This Review process is prayerful, literative, reflective, and participative. It will involve considerable engagement and consultation with the whole of the Church."

At the end of July the MSR have released to the Synod the new Vision Statement and Mission Principles that the Synod and all congregations and agencies within Victoria and Tasmania will be encouraged to use as a way of faith formation and discipleship in our own patches.

Vision statement and mission principles affirmed

The Synod Standing Committee (SSC) affirmed on 24 June 2015 a vision statement and mission principles for the Major Strategic Review.

The MSR will use the vision and mission principles to inspire and direct our proposals.

They can also be used as a framework for discussions by councils and groups within the Church and beyond. They offer us a space to discuss our diversity, unity, faith and mission. They also offer us a clear, accessible resource to engage and interact beyond our already formed community.

You are invited to engage with, reflect on and apply the vision and mission principles in your local context.

We would welcome your feedback regarding your approach and experience of using the vision and mission principles before we include them in our final report due at the end of 2015.

Following Christ, seeking community, compassion and justice for all creation

God in Christ reaches out to the world and calls the Church in the Spirit to:

1. share the Good News of Jesus Christ

2. nurture disciples in lifegiving communities of reconciliation

3. respond in compassion to human need

4. live justly and seek justice for all

5. care for creation

6. express the Gospel in fresh ways for each generation and culture

7. pursue God's mission in partnership

More on the vision and mission

The vision statement is intended to lay the foundation and influence the activities of the Synod with its responsibilities for the general oversight, direction and administration of the Church's worship, witness and service.

The mission principles seek to capture God's big purposes for the loved creation and God's call to the Church. They are not a creed but a tool to provoke questions and examination of the mission of the Church as relevant within your own context.

The inspiration and challenge of the vision statement and mission principles will not come from the words on the paper but from the reflection and discussions initiated.

Approaching that sort of statement with some rigour and determination would lead to some wonderful things – and some fantastic conversations on the journey.
