

Family: Ray never forget the girl he met at school and in 1961 Ray married Judy Chapman at Box Hill Presbyterian Church.


He is the very proud father of children Greg, Jennie, Rod and Carolyn and super proud grandfather to 12!!!

Community Involvement:

Ray was a very active sportsman - cricket and table tennis were his favourites and he is a life member of the Mooroopna Cricket Club and the Shepparton Table Tennis Association.

When two Justices of the Peace retired, the Toolamba area was left without any JP's - Ray was asked if he would consider becoming a JP for the area which he did in 1981 after completing the training. He now works as a volunteer JP at the Shepparton Police Station and enjoys meeting a wide variety of the community in this position.

Ray has been the chairperson of the Toolamba Cemetery Trust for the past 20 years



and plays a major role in its general appearance and upkeep.

Church Involvement:

Ray has been involved with the Presbyterian and now Uniting Church all his life and was elected an elder at the age of 28. He was chairperson of the Waranga Parish Council before he and Judy relocated to Orr St. Shepparton after selling the farm four years ago. There have been some challenges for Ray and Judy adjusting from a small rural congregation where everyone is very well known to each other, to a larger city church but they have appreciated the friendships extended to them. Rays skills and experience and deep commitment to his faith saw him quickly voted on to the Church Council and last year Ray was elected the Church Council Chairperson.

Interfaith Connections Weaving A New Cloth



Weaving a New Cloth is the exciting new report of the national Anglican-Uniting Church Dialogue Group. The report, which was received by the Anglican General Synod in 2014 and by the Uniting Church Assembly in 2015, is the first report of a proposed agreement to be signed by both churches since 1986.

Weaving a New Cloth is an exciting report because it presents ways in which the two churches can collaborate and work together. It focusses on ways in which local churches can work together, providing opportunities for hospitality, shared witness, shared ministry and mission. Although the Anglican and Uniting Churches of Victoria already have an agreement for ways of working together from ranging shared buildings to joint congregations, provided in The Trinity Declaration of 1999, the new report is the first agreement for co-operation between the two churches at national level, and is thus an important document.

Copies of Weaving a New Cloth can be obtained from Joan McRae, who is a member of the Assembly's Christian Unity Working Group. Bishop John Parkes, Bishop of Wangaratta, was the Anglican Co-Chair of the Dialogue Group, so there should be plenty of encouragement for congregations in this Presbytery and in Wangaratta Diocese to work together in new ways. This is particularly important for the rural congregations. The report is straightforward and accessible, and I commend it to you for study and action.

Faith in Action In Jerusalem As An Ecumenical Accompanier

While I was in Jerusalem as an Ecumenical Accompanier earlier this year, I learned a great deal.

I found that this program of the World Council of Churches welcomed contributions from people of many different faiths, and none. And people whose main motivation was political rather than religious had many skills which enriched our work.

I was also challenged by the open practice of religion in daily life, in contrast to our Australian way.

Since 2002, more than 1500 Ecumenical Accompaniers have provided 'protective presence' in Palestine and Israel, accompanying those who are dehumanised every day because of Israeli military occupation. This includes the 'cold violence' of Israeli laws that discriminate against equal rights for Palestinians. EAs also stand alongside Israeli peace activists working to end the occupation.

My placement was in Jerusalem, the religious, political and economic centre for Palestinians and Israelis.

From childhood I'd been fascinated by Bible stories from the 'Holy Land'; I had the privilege of a tour there in 2013. At that time I became more aware of the plight of Palestinian people since the State of Israel was created in 1948. The thousands of Palestinians killed, and millions

displaced, is an injustice still not addressed by the international community.


As a Christian disciple, I was troubled by the misuse of Scripture to justify the abuse of one people by another. The 'righteous' or 'right-living' life to which Scripture calls us always involves seeking justice: these are two sides of the one coin. So becoming an Ecumenical Accompanier gave me an opportunity to act on my concern for vulnerable Palestinian people by supporting them, and those Israelis who work for reconciliation based on peace with justice.

PPTG Report




project. When that work is completed the PPTG expects to be in a position to call for tenders.

UnitingCare Kildonan Globe Award For Diversity Project

Kildonan UnitingCare's Diversity Project Greater Shepparton has been awarded a GLOBE Community Award for its work with young people who are same sex attracted, sex and/or gender diverse (SSASGD).

The annual GLOBE Awards celebrate achievements in Victoria's gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender and intersex (GLBTI) community and highlight the work being done by many organisations to benefit or unite the GLBTI community.

The Diversity Project, which is funded by the state government, works with the communities and services relevant to young people, to support the provision of respectful and safe environments and improve the health and wellbeing of SSASGD 10 to 25 year olds in the Greater Shepparton region. Kildonan UnitingCare CEO Stella Avramopoulos said the award reflects the work being done by the Diversity team to make Shepparton a safer place.

"It was Rowena Allen-Victoria's Gender and Sexuality Commissioner- who established the Diversity Project in Shepparton more than fifteen years ago, and since then, staff and volunteers have been working to create a safer, more inclusive and healthier community for young people in Shepparton," she said.

"The team works hard to ensure that young people can grow and develop while feeling safe to talk about their feelings, thoughts and identities, and importantly, seek the right help when they need it."

The Diversity Project's Damien Stevens said a fortnightly



youth group has helped more than 100 individual young people over the past three years.

"LGBTI people in regional and rural areas can often find it really tough, but every two weeks we create a space where they can come together, hear from guest speakers, share a meal, and connect and engage with others," he said.

The GLOBE Community Awards were judged by the Lady Mayoress of Melbourne Emma Page Campbell, Fairfax journalist Farrah Tomazin and Channel Nine newsreader Peter Hitchener.

The awards were announced at a black tie gala event at the Mural Hall in Melbourne.

Assembly Action Great things, great love: A refugee story

There's an old saying: "We cannot do great things, only small things with great love." Sometimes perhaps we can do both.

Kakuma refugee camp is a sprawling mass of humanity on the border between Kenya and South Sudan. Under canvas and tin supplied by the UNHCR and the Kenyan government, more than 150,000 people make their homes, many separated from brothers, sisters and parents by fighting across the border in South Sudan and Somalia. Into this maelstrom, another little life emerged last month.

Her name is Deborah. She might never have been.

It was an ordinary morning for young South Sudanese midwives completing their prac in the Kakuma Mission hospital. Many in their early twenties, they've been relocated with the help of the Uniting Church in Australia from the South Sudanese town of Leer due to heavy fighting. Their training facility was torched. Some of the women don't know where their families are – many fled into the surrounding bush as rebels stormed the area.

The young women carry on with their studies, supported by UnitingWorld partner the Presbyterian Relief and Development Agency of South Sudan. They're determined to finish their midwifery courses and when stability returns, go back to their country. In the meantime, they study at Kakuma and serve their fellow refugees.

"A woman from the camp was brought in to us," recalls trainee midwife supervisor, Rachel. "She was haemorrhaging and her child experiencing fetal distress. An emergency caesarean was required to save her life and the life of her child. She was South Sudanese and spoke only Dinka, and the doctor requested that our student speak with the distressed woman in Dinka and explain the procedure to her."

Further complications arose and permission needed to be granted for an operation that would save the mother's life - but also make it impossible for her to have further children. Again, the student midwife was called upon to assist, patiently persuading the family of the absolute necessity of the operation in spite of the risks and longterm outcome. Some hours later, a healthy child was born and the mother's life also saved.

"As the mother began to recover, she told our midwife, Deborah, how much her



support and encouragement had meant to her." Rachel says. "It was so important to the young mother that she has named her child after the midwife – Deborah."

"In South Sudan, too many mothers and babies die in childbirth." Rachel says. "I have wanted to be a midwife since I was in primary school. I want to make sure that mothers don't suffer."

It's pretty amazing to reflect on this love and determination, given that these young women are themselves displaced from their homes, living as refugees with no way of knowing where their families are or when they might see them again.

From the minister's desk: Some Things We Do In Worship

In this Edition of the Vine, I wish to reflect on some of the things that we do in worship:

The Introit: We stand for the Introit whilst the Bible is brought in, and the Christ candle is lit. We stand together as community as we anticipate the gift of the 'Word' of God entering the sanctuary, whereby Christ lightened a darkened world – symbolised by the lighting of the Christ candle.

The Call to Worship:

The worship leader here exercised a priestly role of calling people out of the ordinary experiences of life, to an extraordinary event of worshipping God.

The Prayer of Invocation: God as Spirit is invoked that we may be able to worship. The reason being, we cannot worship God ourselves. It is through Jesus Christ, his life, death and resurrection that calls and enables us to worship. He is our great high priest!

The Hymn: A hymn or a song is sung at this time as a response to the call to worship, often being a song of thanksgiving.

The Prayer of Thanksgiving and Confession: After we sing the hymn in response to the call to worship, we are made aware of our sins and frailties by the light of Christ that has now enlightened the whole sanctuary and we ask/seek forgiveness.

The Declaration of Forgiveness: In confessing our sins we are forgiven! The worship leader exercises another priestly role in declaring to the congregation that their sins are forgiven, and a proper response is the doxology, which can be a hymn, song or psalm.

The Readings: There are four readings for each Sunday in the Lectionary, which are read with the Old Testament first, then the Psalm, the Epistle and the Gospel. Often the Psalm of the day is read responsively, as a communal response. In reading all four readings, unity between the old and the new is evidenced, joining with all of God's people throughout history in all that happens during worship.
