Readings: Mathew 9:35 - 38 (NRSV)

35 Then Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom, and healing every disease and every sickness among the people. 36 When he saw the multitudes, he was moved with compassion for them, because they were harassed and scattered, like sheep without a shepherd. 37 Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest indeed is plentiful, but the labourers are few; 38 Pray therefore that the Lord of the harvest will send out labourers into his harvest."

Message: 'The kingdom of God is a kingdom built upon compassion!'.

Prayer: May the words of my mouth and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable to you O God, our rock and our redeemer. **Amen.**

There's a story of a successful young lawyer who drove through a country town and spotted two men on the side of the road eating grass out of somebody's yard. Moved by what he saw, he pulls over to have a word with them.

"Hey fellas, what is going on? Why are you eating grass?" asks the lawyer.

We're down on our luck, we have no jobs and we are very poor!" they both responded.

"Well then, come with me" the lawyer, out of compassion insists. "I'll do what I can to help, after all – its clear you're desperate for help."

After fifteen minutes' drive, the two poor men arrive at a beautiful estate on a five acres of land right on the fifteenth hole of a prestigious golf course. They became excited at the chance to finally get some work.

"Sir, we can't thank you enough! Thank you so much for this opportunity. We will make you happy!"

"Ah, it's no problem. I'm just happy to help," replied the compassionate lawyer. You can eat all the grass you want; it's got to be at least half a metre tall by now!"

Compassion! When that word is used, different people have different ideas about what it means. Religious people even appeal to God as the compassionate God.

Our reading today from the Gospel according to Mathew 9: 35 – 38 can shed some light on what compassion means.

We are told by Mathew that Jesus went about all the cities and the villages, teaching in their synagogues, and preaching the good news of the kingdom, and not just preaching and teaching, but he was also healing every disease and every sickness among the people that

followed him. But then the crowd grew, and Mathew tells us Jesus saw the multitudes and he was moved with compassion.

The meaning of his being compassionate as presented in our passage today is because these people were harassed, they were scattered, and they were like sheep without a shepherd.

A society or community without compassion, we will always find people being harassed for different reasons, a community without compassion will be divided and scattered. Just like sheep without a shepherd.

They are lost, they are hungry, they are homeless, and they are alienated. And the only thing worse than being harassed and scattered, is that they become vulnerable to those who preyed upon them for their own convenience, like the lawyer mentioned before.

May be its unfair to mention just the lawyer, and you might say, 'how about the religious people?'

Here's a story published in the 'Biblical Resources for Preachers and Teachers of the Word of God'.

A man fell into a pit and couldn't get himself out. A Christian Scientist came along and said, "You only think that you are in a pit." A Pharisee said, "Only bad people fall into a pit." A compassion-less fundamentalist said, "You deserve your pit." A Charismatic said, "Just confess that you are not in a pit." A Methodist came by and said, "We brought you some food and some clothing while you were in the pit." A Presbyterian said, "This was no accident, you know." An Optimist said, "Things could be worse." A pessimist said, "Things will get worse!"

But, Jesus, seeing the man, took him by the hand and lifted him out of the pit.

That is the essence of the compassion of Christ. He not only suffers with you, he will save you. It is called GRACE!

It is interesting that after Jesus saw the multitude with compassion, he said to his disciples, "The harvest indeed is plentiful, but the labourers are few" (v. 37), and summoned the disciples to pray to the Lord of the harvest to send labourers. Then, he called his apostles.

Here, the basis of ministry for the church and for all Christians is set forth. The God of compassion is calling labourers of compassion to proclaim the good news of the compassionate gospel to all who are harassed, scattered and lost.

In our compassion-less societies and communities, the call is out for labourers and harvesters who gather the scattered, who advocate justice for the harassed and champion the servant leadership of the Son of God. Amen.
