Loving God, sometimes we have closed our eyes to the possibilities for transformation in our community, our nation, or the world. Forgive us, and restore our sight we ask.

Sometimes we've closed our hearts to the opportunities for renewal within ourselves or within our church. Forgive us, and reshape our hearts we ask.

Sometimes we've held back our gifts, or resisted the gifts that others bring. Forgive us, and grant us courage and grace.

SCRIPTURE READINGS : *Matthew 16 : 13 - 20; Exodus 1 : 8 - 2 : 10.*

MESSAGE:

Picture the scene- the descendants of Jacob had fled famine at home & made a prosperous life on Egypt's Nile delta. But many years have passed & the new pharaoh doesn't know their story. As their numbers increase, he sees them as foreigners, a threat. The pharaoh puts them to hard labour, in the hope of diminishing the population. When that doesn't work he embarks on a new plan - enlisting their midwives to kill any male Hebrew baby.

Let's face it, the Hebrew midwives & pharaoh are at <u>opposite ends</u> of the power spectrum. But Shiphrah & Puah are not deterred, because they fear God rather than the pharaoh. They refuse to carry out his orders; & even come up with a novel excuse when summoned to account for their actions! Next, the pharaoh resorts to enlisting the whole Egyptian population in ethnic cleansing: they are to drown all male Hebrew babies in the Nile River. What fear must have spread among the Hebrew people!

The biblical writers have set the scene for the birth of one whom God will choose to lead his people out of their slavery. How could he survive these circumstances?

In a priestly family, a male baby is born, his life spared by the Hebrew midwives. His mother Jochebed hides him for 3 months when she sees he is a 'fine' or 'good' baby. It's the same word as the one used in the refrain from the 1st creation story: 'God saw that it was good.' It's a clue that God is about to do something creative here too.

Jochebed, hoping to prolong Moses' life, then puts him in a reed basket on the River Nile, watched over by big sister Miriam. Even if she <u>did</u> choose a place near the palace, imagine Jochebed's heart in her mouth as her baby floated away on the river.....

Now more women come to the baby's aid – while the princess is bathing she sees the baby's basket & takes pity on him. Her attendants bring him, & she realises that he's a Hebrew child. She chooses to preserve his life in direct opposition to her father's command! And Miriam plays her part, offering to find a nurse & enlisting the baby's mother. What joyful relief for Jochebed!

In retrospect, God's hand is evident in this chain of events that preserve Moses' life. And growing up in pharaoh's court will help prepare him for his future calling.

Given that this story comes to us from a patriarchal society, it's remarkable in its portrayal of the agency of the women who make up this 'chain of resistance' Shiphrah & Puah; Jochebed & Miriam; & the princess. They weren't planning a revolution; but each one chose to do the next right thing, to be faithful in the moment. They refused to divide people into 'us & them' as the pharaoh wanted. Most likely they didn't live to see the Hebrew people gain their freedom, but they had each played a critical part.....

Today we find ourselves in a situation we couldn't have imagined. From our lives of relative security, & our confidence in medical know-how, a pandemic has caught us unawares. It not only threatens our basic survival, but changes the world we were familiar with.

If we're not careful the fear around us becomes contagious, especially when we can't meet to encourage one another.

The women in Moses' story <u>also</u> lived in a time of fear. They couldn't foresee the future, but they made faithful, life-giving choices in their current circumstances. Can we learn from their focus, & how God might call <u>us</u> to make each daily choice? Can we too be willing to take risks, because we live in the present <u>in the light of God's future?</u>

The current lock-down gives us more time - to nourish our spiritual life; to immerse ourselves afresh in Scripture; to learn to wait on God in our prayer life. And to take more note of God's work of renewal in the world of nature, & give thanks for this.

Like the Hebrew women in Moses' story, we Christians have a different world-view from our neighbours. Our faith gives us a long-term view, finding defiant hope in the 'now' <u>because</u> we trust that God has plans for our future.

Just as God's sovereignty worked through the compassion & care of ordinary women back in Egypt, so God's sovereign plan for our time & place can work through us. As the people of God, we are God's sign of hope for the world's future! Let's bless those around us by taking up the challenge to live in the light, to act with compassion & care, & help bring God's future into the present. Amen.

May those whose lives have been turned upside-down in recent disasters, be given courage to face the huge task of picking up the pieces of their lives. We pray for the suffering people of Beirut; and give thanks that nearby countries have responded quickly, helping with the urgent needs.

May those who long for justice, encounter the faithfulness and action of your people.

We think of thousands of people grieving the deaths of loved ones through Covid-19, unable to be beside them in their final hours. May they know the deep solace that your presence brings in this difficult experience. Please give strength to all front-line workers in this pandemic, & comfort to their families.

We bring before you the faith leaders of our nation & ask you to grant them the gift of wise leadership in these challenging times.

In our presbytery, we remember the congregations of Yarrawonga & Bundalong.

O God, you entrust your life to *us* in many ways. May we always trust you, and follow in the way of your Son, who came not to be served but to serve. May our lives reach out in love to the least and the last, as Jesus did.

Now we pray together the prayer that Jesus taught his disciples..

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be yr name. Your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins, as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial, and deliver us from evil.

For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and forever. Amen.
