### **REFLECTION**

For the world, Christmas 2020 is finished! Christmas decorations have been sold off at half price or less. Boxing Day sales have included returns of unsuitable gifts. Striped candy canes are already being replaced by St Valentine's Day chocolates - or even hot cross buns.

But the church has just begun to celebrate Christmas: this is the third day of Christmas - when, the song tells us, gifts of three French hens are appropriate. We are blessed to have twelve days to celebrate God's greatest gift - of Jesus, born as a human, but our thoughts are already turning to New Year' Eve.

The Gospels are moving us on, too. Luke takes us forty days to the Holy Family's visit to the Temple in Jerusalem. There, two rituals are to take place: Mary's purification after the birth of Jesus, involving her sacrifice of two pigeons, and the presenting of the first-born son. These rites are important enough to bring the little family on a journey very roughly from here to Seymour - but Luke says nothing about them. He wants to tell us how the Good News of God's gift breaks through, reminding the family of Jesus of the incredible gift of God. And so two very old people take centre stage.

Simeon is righteous, devout and constantly looking toward God's salvation.

God has promised that Simeon will not die until he has seen the Lord's Messiah.

We will explore Simeon's response to God's gift of Jesus, and Simeon's prophetic words to Mary. What has 84-year-old widow Anna to say to the Baby?

What does God's incredible gift of this Baby mean to Simeon? to Anna? to us?

Does God's Christmas gift hold more meaning for us this year than ever before?

This is the last Sunday in 2020, a year we may be very glad to end, after COVID-19, lockdowns, separation from loved ones, lament for the losses - and thanks for the supports given. How do we look forward to 2021? Which hopes enliven us? which crises provide new challenges - and new possibilities, especially for churches? What might it mean for you, for me, to be a sign of the Incarnation for others in 2021?
