Prayer of Thanksgiving and Confession:

Thanks be to God for the water of life, shed in tears of grieving then flowing in healing balm. Thanks be to God for the water of kindness, dried up in the scorching heat of our mistakes and returned in kindness to quench our parched souls. Thanks be to God for the water of creativity, spent in lavish self-indulgences and given as a gift for a new future.

O God, just as John the Baptist asked why the Christ would approach him for baptism, so we wonder why you would come to us here.

We are far from worthy to receive you, Jesus Christ. We sometimes wonder if you would do better in a world without our human company.

There are so many times when we fail you, when those we meet receive less than your grace from us.

When we look at the world, we know that we have far to go before your reign is established. We know that at times we have betrayed your hope for your church and for your creation. We have taken much and given little. We serve out of our sense of duty rather than the joy of serving you in the world.

Come close to us now, we pray O God. Refresh our lives with the flowing grace of your forgiveness. Remind us of our calling that we may be your people. In the name of Christ. Amen.

Message: 'Baptism: A new creation, new hope, and a new identity'.

- For many the year 2020 will be remembered for its many challenges and the loss of lives. The responses to the global pandemic have taken centre stage in the news and social media, and even in passing conversations in the streets.
- Towards the close of 2020, many commented that it is a year to forget. They are hoping that this year 2021 could be different with better, brighter days.
- And there are of course those who wish they had done things differently.
- What the global pandemic has done for many is to highlight what is really important in life. And often the lament I hear "I wish I hadn't said that', I wish I had acted in a different way, I just want to live my life differently now.'
- All these reveals something about us because the things we hope for, how we see ourselves and the things we do are intimately connected.
- And what we need most is the opportunity to start again. The opportunity to live at the deeper level, the chance to participate and be part of a new creation.
- A new creation in which the first day of that new creation is today. A day that we welcome with excitement and newness.
- Can you remember the first day of your married life? That was the day that held all the promises that might be or can be. The day when no harsh words had been spoken, no feelings hurt, and you were alive, full of dreams and possibilities.
- What about the first day of being a parent? You look at your first born with joy in your heart and you can't think of the right word to say.
- I would like to suggest that that is how God looked at the first day, in the beginning of time. No relationship broken, no guilt or regret and no sin to confess.
- A new day of a new creation full of light, the light of life, the light of love, the light of promise and hope; the light of God. And it was good and therefore since then, the first day is always a day of creation!
- Today, as we celebrate the baptism of Jesus, our readings suggest and continue to remind us every year, that this is and can be the first day of a new creation for you and your family, for the church and for the whole world.
- Our wishes for a new beginning and a new day is not really about turning back time. It is about becoming a new creation, a new being, a new hope with a new identity.
- Ultimately, it is about returning to the waters of Jesus' baptisms. And that is what we are doing today.
- We gather around the symbols of his baptism and return to the first day of creation.

- Our reading from Genesis tells us that in the beginning the Spirit of God hovered over the waters.
- We hear from Marks gospel that the Spirit of God descended on Jesus as he is coming up out of the water.
- In the beginning God said, "Let there be light."
- At Jesus' baptism God said, "You are my Son, the Beloved."
- In Jesus' baptism God was "well pleased."
- The creation and the baptism of Jesus are God's gifts to us. In these gifts, God is present to us and everything that God does God does it for us.
- The Son of God did not need a baptism, we needed Him to be baptized. The baptismal water did not sanctify Jesus; Jesus sanctified the baptismal water for us. Jesus' baptism is not the means by which we identify with Him; it is the means by which He identifies with us. Our baptism allows us to participate in His baptism.
- In the baptism of Jesus, the whole of humanity is being presented and baptized. It is to that union between humanity and the divine in Jesus Christ that the Spirit descended.
- It is our humanity in this new creation that the Father spoke and with whom He was well pleased.
- The whole of humanity is again recreated in the baptism of Jesus. This is the first day of that new creation. In baptism we are a new creation, a new being.
- Every time we return to this sanctuary and gather around the baptismal font, we claim our new identity in Jesus as beloved sons and daughters.
- Every time we gather around this baptismal font God again manifests and reveals himself in humanity.
- Every time we gather around this baptismal font, we return to that first day of light, love, life, and the promise of all that might be.
- Whatever your life has been or might now be, the baptismal waters await you. So, come. As we gather around the baptismal font, we return to the water. Let the water of Jesus' baptism wash and rid you of fear, resentment and despair. Immerse yourself in the mercy of God's love. Bathe yourselves in the water of God's forgiveness and enjoy the current of God's grace.
- Let today be the first day of a new beginning in God's new creation.

God, in your mercy,

hear our prayer.

Ever living and Eternal God, by the death and resurrection of your Son you bring us to new and everlasting life: may we so pattern our lives on your Son, that we, also, may be found pleasing in your eyes and take our place with your beloved daughters and sons of every time and nation.

God, in your mercy, hear our prayer. Amen!
