PRAYER OF CONFESSION

BIBLE READINGS:

Mark 9:2-9 2 Corinthians 4:3-6

REFLECTION

There are hinge points in our lives; moments when we know life will never be the same again. Sometimes we know it at the time – on the birth of a child, at weddings, or at a time of loss. Then there are other events that only become clearer as a hinge point in hindsight – the decision-making moment that made for a new life direction, or meeting someone for the first time who turned out to be a significant person in the future.

The story of the transfiguration is a hinge point in the church year. It is the moment where the humanity and divinity of Christ collide, where the mystery and reality of life are held in tension, where the story changes as we move out of Epiphany and into the Lenten journey towards Jerusalem. It is the moment of going up the mountain to places of divine, ethereal encounter and down the mountain to places of reality, suffering and service.

So - as we stand on the edge of our Lenten journey it is crucial that we reflect on that extraordinary moment of Jesus' transfiguration. Following Jesus involves much giving out and sometimes there are not a lot of opportunities to take-in. There are times when we all need that extra assurance and reassurance of God's presence and power - perhaps especially in these coming weeks so that we can participate as fully as possible in a journey that invites us all to self-examination and repentance- that challenges us to walk the way of the cross. And that assurance is present for us in our gospel lesson for today - as it was for Jesus.

Back towards the beginning of our Epiphany journey, we encountered Jesus being baptised in the Jordan. There was a unique event that accompanied this baptism - the descent of the Spirit from heaven and the voice declaring Jesus to be the Son of God. At his baptism, in an atmosphere of prayer, Jesus' ministry and mission was initiated.

Full of the Spirit, Jesus left the waters of his baptism. Between that event, however, and the Transfiguration, Jesus was involved with radical teaching, compassionate healing, miraculous feeding - always, it seems, accompanied by ever growing crowds. All energy-depleting exercises.

Jesus' teaching concerning good news for those who are poor, pardon for those captivated by sin, new ways of seeing in a world unrestricted by legalistic practices, and liberation for those who are oppressed, was teaching that was not and is not always welcome, because it might just upset the status quo. And Jesus did upset and even antagonise his listeners with his challenging and provocative words. Not unusual, but perhaps spiritually depleting. As Jesus moved around the countryside I wonder did he have a growing awareness that what he did, what he said, what he taught, would ultimately lead to his suffering and death?

In verses preceding the account of the Transfiguration we find Jesus asking the disciples who the people thought he was. And of the disciples he asked: Who do you say that I am? Did he need their affirmation to dispel any doubts about what seemed to be shaping up as an inevitable future. Did the prospect of that future, as he verbalised it with his disciples, begin to clutch at him with a sense of uneasiness if not fear?

Jesus shared our humanity, therefore he must have shared our human fears and our human doubts. Wouldn't he need to be assured and reassured - especially reassured that God's power and presence were still an essential part of his being.

So - he went up the mountain to pray.

Jesus' prayers were surely answered in abundance as he received affirmation from God in that glorious mountain-top experience, in the presence of these two great figures from Jewish faith history - Moses and Elijah. They spoke to him about his departure - his death - a new exodus through which people would experience liberation from the power of death and new life in the Spirit. And Jesus' shining outward appearance was surely a manifestation of the strengthening of his Spirit which he received that day- empowering him to set his face towards Jerusalem – and the cross.

And most of this was observed by the three awestruck disciples, who realised that the presence and glory of God were far more real than the grass at their feet and the sky overhead.

There, the human was overshadowed by the divine.

There, Jesus heard the very voice which had commissioned him at his baptism – with similar words "This is my Son, my Beloved..."

And the disciples, when they had recovered from the shock of this close encounter with God, must have had their faith in Jesus confirmed when they too heard the divine voice with the added command "Listen to him".

We have our faith confirmed also as we listen to Jesus - the source and substance of our faith. The more closely we listen, the more likely we are to reflect God's glory into the world. When we do, lives and situations are transfigured sometimes in ways we would never dream possible.
