BIBLE READINGS: Luke 24:36-48

Acts 3:12-19

REFLECTION

Last week the gospel reading came from John's gospel and recounted the experience the disciples had of Jesus coming to them through locked doors. He showed them, and later Thomas, his hands and his side, and blessed them with words of peace. "Peace be with you".

This week we are invited to share Luke's account of the post-resurrection appearance of Jesus to his disciples.

I invite you to put yourself into the story.Imagine what it was like. Try to imagine what the disciples and other followers were feeling immediately after Jesus' crucifixion. They must have been feeling overwhelmed, frightened and confused, not knowing where to turn or what to do next. Their leader and teacher who had held them together all those long months was dead and buried, executed like a common criminal, and lying in a tomb (or so they thought). What a disappointing turn of events! With Jesus into that tomb went their hope, their vision, their sense of direction and purpose in life. They were left only with an overwhelming sense of failure, loss, and shame, because they knew they had deserted Jesus in his hour of need.

And then - come into the room as we pick up the story where those on the road to Emmaus had come back to tell the others that they had broken bread with Jesus... Suddenly Jesus himself is standing among them, and again - those words: "Peace be with you."

What a roller coaster those first followers of Jesus had been on — the highs of entering Jerusalem; the solemness of the Passover meal; the fear of Jesus being arrested in the night; the deep, deep sadness of Jesus' death and resurrection. Imagine the joy in others when they said they had seen the risen Jesus, the confusion in still not really understanding what is going on, the uncertainty of what might come next...

Into all of this, Jesus enters. If it was hard to deal with the feelings before, imagine what it would have been like at that point! This is not a ghost—this is Jesus—flesh and bones—standing in front of you. And he speaks: *Peace be with you*...

And with those four words – $peace\ be\ with\ you$ – the turmoil and uncertainty of that week is gone. There is a new peace – a peace that hasn't been known before.

There is no doubt we have had (or will have) times like this in our lives – those times where we feel like there is no way out. But we can find peace in Christ, even if the circumstances or the outcome doesn't change. How we feel, how we react, how we keep going, all change with those words of peace.

Verse 41 reminds us that the disciples' heads had not caught up with their hearts yet. They were overjoyed at seeing the risen Christ, and yet this was not or could not be matched by any understanding in their heads. Surely, there were more questions than answers. And yet, there was still peace.

Have there been places or times in your life where you have experienced uncertainty and doubt; a time when there have been more questions than answers?

Have there been places or times in your life where you have experienced the peace of Christ in

Whatever overwhelms us, God comes to us in the midst of our fear and says, "Peace be with you." Whatever doubts churn in our minds, whatever sins trouble our consciences, whatever pain and worry bind us up, whatever walls we have put up or doors we have locked securely, God comes to us and says, "Peace be with you." As we continue to celebrate the risen Christ in this Easter season, may you find a place in your life where you can hear Christ say to you, "Peace be with you," as you allow him to fill your heart and life with his peace that passes all understanding. Amen
