Young Church: 'Stormy seas' (Based on Mark 4: 35 – 41)

Readings: 1 Samuel 17: 32 – 49, 2 Corinthians 6: 1 – 13, Mark 4: 35 – 41.

Hymn: 607 (TiS) 'Make me a channel of your peace'.

Sermon: (Mark 4: 35 – 41)

- 'On that day, when evening had come, he said to them, "Let us go across to the other side." And leaving the crowd behind, they took him with them in the boat, just as he was. Other boats were with him. (vv. 35 36)
- In those two verses, we get a glimpse of what Jesus's mission and ministry is all about.
- We are not told by Mark as to why Jesus wanted to go across the Sea of Galilee. But we are told that it was evening on that day when Jesus told them "Let us go across to the other side.
- Here we see the beginning of ministry and mission. It always begins when evening comes, when the world is darkened, when people are living their lives in the dark. It may be grief, it could a lack of faith or loneliness. People can lose hope in the dark and they panic.
- On the way to the 'other side' the heavenly shore, we encounter danger in the dark. Stormy seas can overwhelm us. Stormy relationship, stormy family issues, stormy personal weaknesses etc.
- It is in the evening; even experienced seamen can encounter stormy weather and Mark mentioned it was a 'great storm' and these seasoned fishermen thought they were going to perish.
- Christ's ministry requires a kind of 'leaving behind'. They left the crowd behind. We are often asked or called to leave behind what is popular and manageable, to leave behind the familiar and the predictable, leave behind our crowded ways.
- There is also a kind of urgency in ministry as Jesus demonstrated by leaving 'just as he was'. We often put off the opportunity to serve or to respond to God's call to 'go

across' to the other side for fear of not being properly equipped or trained or even resourced.

- As we find out in this story, to have Jesus in our boat is enough.
- The storm of life may come and will come so what will be our response? The disciples at least knew that Jesus was in the boat. To their credit they woke him up for he had slept on a cushion in the stern of the boat.
- They woke him up not to ask for help but to accuse him of his lack of care and indifference. The disciples had already figured out what is to become of them even with Jesus in the boat.
- We do this too when God seems to be asleep when we encounter difficulties. We accuse God of not caring, at caring enough about our predicament whether it is a terminal illness or an abusive behaviour that threatens our well-being and our life.
- Yet, there is good news in the end. Jesus woke up and rebukes the wind just as he had done with the evil spirits in Mark 1: 25. "Peace! Be still!"
- "Then the wind ceased, and there was a dead calm". The Christ will always be present, Christ will always offer God's peace. Christ who rebukes the storm and evil spirits is always available even if he seems to be asleep.
- One more detail that Mark decides to put in this story is "Other boats were with him".
- I believe that the people in those 'other boats' were as afraid about the storm as the disciples did but they didn't have a sleeping Jesus in their boats the good news, and I believe that we can see that the calming of the storm benefits all.
- There are times when we are so preoccupied with the 'other boats', whether they deserve to be saved or not there is no discrimination here, no institutional or doctrinal arguments. When Jesus calms the storm, all at sea find peace. Jesus need only to be in one boat, Jesus need only to hear our desperate cries and all will be saved.
- To have faith is to trust that Jesus who is amongst us will save us and all people if we take our concerns to him in prayer. Amen!

When we are overwhelmed by hopelessness and grief, when our pain seems more than we can bear, calm our terrors and still our souls, that we may know your presence and your power.

God our deliverer,

hear our prayer.

We pray for those who have died: for those whose death has been violent or untimely; for those who have died unlamented and unloved.

When we are overwhelmed by the storms of life, when we come to face our own death, calm our terrors and still our souls, and by your power bring us into the joy of your eternal presence. God our deliverer,

hear our prayer. Amen.
