Doxology: 768 (TiS) 'Praise God from whom all blessings flow.'

Readings: Jeremiah 31: 7-14, John 1: 10-18

Message: 'The future begins today.'

- The theme may sound like a contradiction because we normally think of the future as that time which is yet to be. We have divided time into three main categories: the past, which is what has happened already, the present is that what is happening now and the future which is yet to be.

- There are those who tried to define the three categories of time like Eleanor Roosevelt, the wife of the 32<sup>nd</sup> president of America who said this: "Yesterday is history, tomorrow is mystery, and today is a gift that is why we called it the present." Travis Dultz, a thinker said this: "Yesterday is relative, tomorrow is speculative, and today is electric that's why we called it current."
- Some may think that I don't have any concept of time at all but what I am referring to, of course is the Incarnation. The Word made flesh and dwelt among us. The intersection between human and the divine, between the temporal and the eternal.
- The birth of the Christ child is the birth of tomorrow today. Whatever it is that we have been hoping for, our fears and anxieties about this life and the life hereafter are met in the birth of Jesus. The history of salvation is fulfilled in Jesus Christ.
- The Eternal God who created the whole universe at the beginning of time is now living with human beings in the temporal world, transforming and recreating the whole of creation into God's kingdom.
- One of our Christmas carols puts it this way: Hail the heaven born Prince of Peace! Hail the Sun of Righteousness! Light and life to all he brings, risen with healing in his wings: mild he lay his glory by, born that we no more may die, born to give us second birth...' (TiS. v.3)
- The birth of the Messiah has broken down the barriers between life and death, between light and darkness, and offered a bridge between heaven and earth.
- The gospel of John opens with the prologue, or the beginning, so rather than start at verse 10, which began our reading for today, let us go back to the beginning.
- The first thirteen verses summarise the relationship between the Word and the world as its rejected Creator, Visitor, Light, and Saviour. John is directing us very quickly from the celebration of the birth of Jesus to its theological meaning.
- This is a challenging theological reflection on how the Word was at the beginning, how the Word was with God, and how the Word is God. John introduces us to the incarnation, how God breaks into human history as a human being, a child who will become the Light for all people. Light that darkness cannot overcome.
- God coming near to us as Word incarnate in a child, he is good news in a person and yet, many still fail to hear, to believe.
- We can easily get ourselves lost in the Christmas story and the excitement of the baby while forgetting the majesty and the power of an almighty God who was there at the beginning creating and now recreating. It is the same God that will be there at the end of time.
- The incarnation then is that, the God of our future is here with us today bringing with him the future to today. The characteristics of that future is with us today. Peace, joy, full of grace and hope.
- In that future which is today because of the birth of Jesus gives light to our darkened world, it is possible to love unconditionally, to forgive without looking for reward, to open our prison doors and set the captives free.



- Our Creator, the Word, is coming among us and is with us in compassion, showing us how to love, how to reconcile to God and others, and ultimately showing us how to be fully human.
- It is good news indeed: The Word became flesh and lived among us and from his fullness, we have received grace upon grace (v14-16), and those who believe becomes children of God.
