DAY OF MOURNING 2022 Assembly News

On Sunday January 23, many Uniting Church communities across the country mark a Day of Mourning in worship services will reflect on and lament the effects of invasion and colonisation on Australia's First Peoples. UCA President, Rev Sharon Holllis, and UAICC National Interim Chair Rev Mark Kickett, have recorded a conversation, accessed through Assembly News.



UNITING IN PRAYER FOR TONGA Assembly News

"Uniting Church in Australia President Rev Sharon Hollis and Chair of the Uniting Church's Tongan National Conference Rev Feke Kamitoni have encouraged people to pray for Tonga after it was hit by a tsunami late on Saturday night. ...

'I encourage all Uniting church members to join in prayer for the people of Tonga and across the Pacific who have been impacted by the tsunami,' said Rev Hollis, 'We pray for people's safety, for those whose homes have been lost or damaged and all those anxiously awaiting news of loved ones.' I also encourage members of the Uniting Church to be in touch with people they know in the Tongan-Australian community to offer them support at this very stressful time as they wait for news of friends and family.'

"Since the tsunami hit, the Tongan community across Australia have rallied together. An online prayer vigil was hosted by Pasifika TV and Radio. Uniting Church Tongan members... have played a role in the broadcast."

'Rev Kamitoni said many elderly members of the community were concerned about siblings and relatives and there were many seasonal workers living in Australia worried about their children and families.'

Assembly News includes A Prayer for Tonga, Rev Loni Vaitoni. Because it is in Tongan, the prayer is not included here.

UnitingWorld is ready to support the Uniting Church's Tongan partners as soon as needs have been assessed. *UnitingWorld* will work through its partner, the Free Wesleyan Church of Tonga.

Act for Peace (Christmas Bowl) launched an Emergency Appeal for Tonga on Monday. By Thursday, \$66,000 had been subscribed. Act for Peace will work through its partners, the Tongan National Council of Churches.

LONI REPORTS:

The Vaitohi village, Kanokupolu, on the island of Tongatapu, is one of the six villages hardest hit: 21 homes were completely destroyed and over 30 damaged. The people of the village were all evacuated before the tsunami hit but they were able to return to the village during the day. The Queen of Tonga has visited the village with food and water and words of encouragement. According to the Chair of the Tongan Parliament, agriculture is ruined over much of Tonga – 155 islands; 37 inhabited.

There were no lives lost in this village, but the recovery will take a long time. Though their hearts may be broken, their will is not.

We are also remembering Loni's brother Taani, Tess and their family. The Losaki family (Lavinia, Tevake and family) village is on Vava'u island, which is higher above sea level. Manatu's village is also on Tongatapu, but on higher ground near the airport (Lisa, Manatu and family; Edna's sisters were evacuated). I note that Loni has two siblings living in the village; Loni's house was destroyed.

When needs have been assessed, Shepparton Uniting Church expects to hold an appeal.

The ABC Online News Friday 21 quotes a United Nations figure of 84,000 people in Tonga – over 80% of the population – who have been affected – by destruction, volcanic ash, undrinkable water. On some small islands all houses have been destroyed. Then there is the long-term effect on agriculture, mentioned above.
