The annual service to mark the beginning of Lent this year falls on March 2 and will be held at 7.00pm. You are invited to join this time of prayer, reflection and refreshment. Dust and ashes. How do we prepare for the penitential six weeks of Lent, leading to Good Friday - and Easter? Giving up? Taking up?

Friday 4 World Day of Prayer, St Brendan's Church, 10.30am. Another annual service, always held on the first Friday of March. This year's service was prepared by the World Day of Prayer Committee of England, Wales and Northern Ireland. The theme is *I Know the Plans I Have for You.*

NOTES ON THE CHURCH CALENDAR

Epiphany January 6 celebrates the bringing of the Light of Christ to an ever-increasing circle. The visit of the Star-led Wise People from the East to the Holy Family in Bethlehem marks a beginning of the revelation of God to the world in Jesus Christ. Since then we have travelled through the season After Epiphany (mostly abbreviated to 'Epiphany') until the last Sunday before Lent. This year, that is the seventh Sunday. This last Sunday is celebrated as the Feast of the Transfiguration, when the glory of Jesus is revealed in a new way.

Shrove Tuesday is the day before Ash Wednesday and is a day of preparation for the penitential season of Lent. The English word 'Shrove' began as 'shrive' and refers to confession of sins in preparation for Lent, so people are forgiven. It was originally a solemn day, marked by church services, especially in Europe during the Middle Ages. The service

included the burning of the palm leaves from the previous Palm Sunday, ready for Ash Wednesday. But today this understanding may well be overlooked by many, who forget the confession in favour of the feasting! This 'last hurrah before Lent' is often known by its French name, 'mardi gras' – Fat Tuesday. The custom of using up foods coming from animals, not to be eaten again until Easter - butter, eggs, cheese and fat, even milk—on the day before Ash Wednesday led to the feasting we, who do not give up those foods during Lent!- yet celebrate in the making of pancakes. (Countries whose language is derived from Latin celebrate Carnivale – farewell to meat.). Mardi Gras and Carnivale also have different meaning for many, these days!

Ash Wednesday always falls 46 days before Easter Day. The season of Lent has two main themes, repentance, and preparation for sharing in the death and resurrection of Christ. For us this is a time to grow through repentance, fellowship, prayer and remembering our baptism. The other very old aspect, fasting, or 'giving up', is less observed these days, especially in the Uniting Church. But we are encouraged to 'take up' some extra dimension of spiritual life, so that we are truly signs of God's kingdom in the world. In Lent, we focus on being receptive to God's grace, growing in our faith and spiritual life.

Ashes have a long history, dating back to Old Testament times, where they were a symbol of purification, and also a sign of penitence. In the early days of the Church, penitents often sprinkled ashes on their heads in public services of penitence. By the tenth century, Christians generally went to church the Wednesday before the first Sunday in Lent to have blessed ashes made from the previous year's palms put on their foreheads. This was a sign of their penitence. And yes, our palms are burnt on Shrove Tuesday for our ashes.

May we be blessed in our walking together through this holy season in 2022!
