Doxology: 771 (TiS) 'Now to him who loved, gave us'

Readings: Deuteronomy 26: 1-11, Luke 4: 1-13

Sermon brief:

- The temptation of Jesus happened in the wilderness where he had fasted for forty days.

- He is tempted the same way the people of Israel were tempted in the wilderness of Sinai.
- The first temptation was about 'trust'. His trust on God or trusting his own power to provide for his own needs. "If you are the Son of God, command this bread to become a loaf of bread" (Lk 4: 1-3)
- The second temptation is about 'faithfulness'. Faithfulness to God or to Satan who flatters him with power and glory. "If you then, will worship me, it will be yours". (Lk 4: 5-8)
- The third temptation is about 'identity'. "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here." (Lk 4: 9-12)
- Jesus' response to these temptations, unlike the Israelites in the wilderness (Deuteronomy 6-8), he remained trusting in the power of God to provide, he remained faithful to his relationship with the Father, and he is the Son of God precisely because he did not succumb to the temptation of earthly power and glory.
- When Jesus took on human flesh, he took on all that we are including our very human weaknesses and showed us why, "For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathise with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin" (Hebrews 4:15).
- The whole episode of the temptation of Jesus is based on the idea that he is the Son of God "If you are the Son of God..." (Lk 4:3, 4:9)
- What is Jesus going to do with the power and glory as the Son of God? Does he have to prove that to himself?
- The people of Israel were tempted in the desert to try and test God but, as Beswick reminded us 'It is an affront to the love of God to put him to the test. Even in ordinary human relationships, to put your loved ones love to the test is already an act of betrayal'.
- We all have our own temptations, external and personal temptations which may depend on our circumstances, who we are, what we aspire to.
- We can learn from Jesus and how he responds to his temptation on how to respond when we are tempted.
- First temptation, Jesus said, "It is written..." (4:4). Jesus made reference to Scripture which the devil seems to understand.
- In the second temptation, Jesus again respond with "It is written..." (4:8).
- It is helpful to remember that Scripture is at the centre of Jesus' mission and ours. We must make time to study and reflect upon it for our own response for when we are tempted with what we think we need, with power and prestige and privileges.
- How we respond to temptation has life changing consequences.
- Imagine what would have happened if Jesus had turned aside from his calling as God's servant king and had create luxuries for himself.
- The temptation to work solely to meet our needs is favourable to many, but it not only to meet our needs (2 Thessalonians 3: 10), our work is meant to serve others also.

We pray this day for those who suffer depression and mental disorder; that they may find hope within the darkness.

We pray this day for those whom we lift up to you in silence...

Good and gracious God give us courage to follow your Son, and wisdom to walk the way. Gather us, shelter us, protect us as we are led to the cross.
