BIBLE READINGS: Luke 10:1-11, 16-20

REFLECTION

Today's story from John's gospel is one we will be familiar with.

Jesus sends out his disciples – not only the 12, but seventy two people altogether, to travel in pairs and prepare the way for Jesus to follow. They have certain instructions. They are to travel light – no purse, bag, or sandals. In order to get the job done, they will not have time to care about material possessions or to waste time on other distractions.

They are to go in peace, they are to accept hospitality when it is offered, and they are to cure the sick. When not welcomed by any group they are to wipe the dust off their feet and move on to the next place, for the urgency of their mission does not allow time to linger in hopeless situations.

It won't be an easy task – a bit like sending lambs among the wolves, because they will meet difficult people, including sceptics, Jewish fundamentalists, Samaritans, Gentiles, and Roman officials.



What might we find in this gospel reading that is relevant to our own time?

There's not a lot that resonates with our current circumstances. For starters it's almost impossible to travel light these days – we need our mobile phone and charger, and several changes of clothes, and solid shoes for walking, and so on.

On the other hand the harvest is still plentiful, perhaps even more so, and the workers are increasingly few. The results of the census that are just emerging tell a stark story of declining religious practice in Australia.

One of the elements of this story that jumps out to me is the importance of teamwork. Jesus sent out seventy-two people, or it could have been 70 as some ancient manuscripts have recorded. Whatever the number, he specifically asked them to travel in pairs and I suggest there is something we can learn from this. There is so much that a good team can accomplish when they work together.

Perhaps Jesus understood the importance of forming teams to go out and do his work. Had they gone out alone, it's possible that they could have covered more ground or preached to more people, but Jesus sees something significant in this idea of sending them out together.

By sending the 72 out in pairs, Jesus made sure that they could be there for each other, hold each other accountable, and remind each other that their mission was not to be cluttered by unnecessary baggage. Heading out together would mean they could lift each other's spirits when times got tough or tell stories to each other to pass the time on their long journeys. But above all, by sending them out in pairs, Jesus reassured them that they were not alone. This work to which they were called would not be a solitary endeavour. "You're going to need each other," Jesus was telling them.

We need each other, too. Often we feel like we have to do everything on our own; to be our own self-made man or woman. We live in a society that champions the individual, but how lonely this attitude can be. It's lonely when we have to face life's many challenges by ourselves. What a comfort it is, then, to hear Jesus tell us today that we're not alone. Life does at times feel like we are sheep in the midst of wolves, but we do not have to face the wolves by ourselves; after all, Jesus sent the seventy-two to places that he himself intended to go. It is no different for us. Not only does Jesus send us out with someone by our side - be they a partner, a sibling, a best friend, or the community of a church -he promises that he will follow behind us and work in those mysterious ways that we cannot ever fully understand. What we can understand is that Jesus does not call us into solitary ministry.

This doesn't mean everything is always going to be sunshine when we step out into the fearful world of mission. Sometimes teams have a tough time working together, and plenty of bumps in the road pop up. We make mistakes and at times we clash with those with whom we work. I'm sure the seventy-two didn't always get along, either. Still, they knew they needed each other. We need each other also.

The other standout element of this story is that the seventy-two returned in joy. Amazing things had taken place, but perhaps even more amazing must have been the fact that they now knew each other. After walking and talking together, there had been new depths of interpersonal relationships explored, and deep joy in discovering authentic community.

Whatever our mission in this day and place, we are in it together. We need each other for the work of bringing about the Kingdom here on earth as it is in heaven. This is not solitary work. Shortly we will share the Lord's Supper together. May its significance be reinforced as we are fed together. And may we go from this time of worship realising that in Shepparton, at this time in history we are in effect the seventy-two who go, in tandem with those from other faith communities, to nurture those around us, What a privilege! Amen
