## **NAIDOC WEEK** from Assembly News.

Reflecting on the theme, Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress Interim National Chairperson Rev Mark Kickett said it was a reminder of the call of God on our lives and an invitation to reflect on the journey we have been on as First and Second Peoples. 'The colonisation of this country disempowered and took away all that we were as human, as First Nations People, created in the image of God. This week we recall those who were not afraid to be brave, to stand up to injustice, to say, "this is not right".

We are reminded of where the path of following God takes us. God is calling us to get involved. To stand up and be brave. To stand up and be counted.'

Uniting Church President, Rev Sharon Hollis, said NAIDOC Week was an opportunity to celebrate First Nations People – all they've achieved and all they long for in these lands.'

We are invited to explore ways to *Live the Covenant Locally*.

#### 2021 CENSUS DATA

The 2021 Census figures recently released show that Australians are less interested in Christianity. More than 670,000 people identified with the Uniting Church, a decline of around 22 per cent since 2016.

Rev Sharon Hollis considers the call to be creative, courageous and hopeful. She notes a downward trend in the Uniting Church, with 2.6 per cent of Census respondents identifying with the UCA, compared to 3.7 per cent in 2016. These figures point to decline but also to an opportunity to reset, re-examine our life as the Uniting Church and to discern the call of the Spirit in the transformation that is taking place. There is an opportunity to reshape how we see ourselves in the public space. We need to develop a deeper theology of living our faith away from the centre of society. There is an opportunity to listen to those who no longer identify with organised Christian churches. To wonder, with humility, why fewer people are interested in hearing from the church about the Gospel. It demands a willingness to change those things in our life that hinder people from hearing the good news of love, justice and life that the story of Jesus proclaims.

The President notes that we have to take seriously what these trends say about the medium-term future of the Uniting Church. We must take steps to rethink our polity, structure and practices to enable us to respond better to declining membership and grasp the opportunities for new ways of being followers of Christ. Most of all, we should not lose heart. We need to be creative, courageous and hopeful about the good news of life in Jesus Christ. Let us seek fresh and new ways to share the story of Jesus, seeking to witness to God's transforming love in all we do, concludes the President.
