Readings

Jeremiah 2: 4-13 Luke 14: 1, 7-14

Message: 'Beware where you sit'

- Beware where you sit is something we are familiar with, whether we in a football match, a musical concert or even at church. This is because where you sit can reveal a little bit more about yourself.
- Our socio-economic and cultural/traditional matrix are often on display when we are required to sit. You don't sit on expensive seats in a football finals match if you didn't pay the right amount of money. You don't sit in honoured places if you are not an honoured guest.
- We read from the gospel story this morning how Jesus was invited to the house of a leading Pharisee on a particular Sunday. So Jesus focus in on the meal scene and saw how guests would chose the places of honour. Why not? I would!
- This may have reminded Jesus about his own place in the world and where he would finally be seated when all is being fulfilled.
- Jesus then responded by telling a parable to try and discourage his listeners from seeking the most prestigious seat, to avoid the humiliation of being displaced by someone more important. Therefore they should take the lowest places so that the host might elevate them to a more honourable place.
- And Jesus concludes with this reminder, "For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted" (14:11).
- Jesus was very much aware of the social expectation of the time and the social disparities especially during meal times. So Jesus does not castigate the system of honour at meal time and advices his isteners about humility which should be a mark of his followers.
- Then Jesus speaks directly to the host the leading Pharisee. He asks the hosts not to invite friends, family, and the rich to his meal table since they are able to repay him with corresponding courtesy.
- Instead, Jesus asks for the inclusion of those who cannot return the invitation: "the poor, the crippled, the lame and the blind" (14:13).
