AN EARLY WORD

TiS 619 Have faith in God my heart

Bible Readings: Luke 12:32-40 Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16

Reflection

There is a lot about the letter to the Hebrews that we don't know. We don't know who wrote it, nor exactly who it was written to, although the context suggests the recipients were a group of Jewish Christians. While some parts of Hebrews are not so well known, many will recognise the content of chapter 11. In these verses we are presented with a remarkable gathering of Old Testament giants of the faith whose stories we know and who continue to inspire.

Faith – the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things unseen.

And by faith – by faith these members of what we might call the Hall of Faith went forward with confidence in God whose promises are faithful.

Why did the Hebrews author write this letter? It would appear from the previous chapter that that the recipients of the letter were dealing with difficult circumstances and uncertain times. They were under the threat of persecution and perhaps even death, probably due to their relationship with Jesus, and the personal costliness of following



Jesus was turning people away from the church. So the author carefully reminds them of these ancient Hebrews whose stories they would have known so well, and from whom they might draw encouragement and confidence.

The verses we heard today focus particularly on Abraham, who was instructed to gather his family and belongings and go into an unknown land. And he went. He was old, he was childless, he was vulnerable, he was uncertain. – but he went and eventually experienced the fulfilment of God's promises. It's one of many great stories of faith to offer a bunch of Jewish Christians who are fearing for their lives. The author uses the story of Abraham and others to urge people to hang on to their faith in God. He reminds them that Abraham's faith was not some wishful thinking about the future. It was a confidence in God's future upon which he acted in the present. Such faith was not based on the human capacity to have faith, but rather it was based on God whose promises are faithful.

There are many sermons that could be written about faith, but for me this sentence from one scholar says it all: "Faith is stepping out into the unknown with nothing to guide us but a hand just beyond our grasp."

Another person has written:

Faith is not something vague, uncertain, undefinable, or something which requires a leap of the imagination or worse, some kind of blind allegiance. In fact, it is quite the opposite. Faith is a response of trust and belief in what is reliable, truthful, certain, and real. To have faith is to believe and trust in someone or something. We believe in the power of electricity even though we can't visibly see it with the naked eye. We know we can tap into that power and use it to do things we could not do by our own human power. Faith in God works in a similar way. When God reveals himself to us he gives us the "assurance" and "conviction" that his power and presence and glory is just as real, and even more real, than our experience of the natural physical world around us. Things around us change, but God never changes. God is constant, ever true to his word, and always faithful to his promises. That is why we can have the greatest assurance of his unconditional love for us.

Does the letter to the Hebrews have any relevance for us today? I think yes.

We stand at a moment in history where we are faced with a multitude of uncertainties. Covid, cost of living, climate change, culture, scarcity of food and personnel for vital tasks, aggression and war, even conversations about a dying church. The sum total of all this and more makes us feel more vulnerable than we have for a long time. The Hebrews writer invoked the faithful characters of the past to encourage faith and steadfastness but didn't stop there. He invited his readers to look up and gaze with hope and confidence into the future, reassuring them of God's faithfulness. We are invited to do the same.

Who might we look back on from our past – those faithful people who have given us encouragement and hope on our faith journey? Remember them, and reflect on their example – but don't stay there. Lift your gaze then to the horizon, confident of God's faithfulness guiding you into the future. We may not be certain of what lies ahead, but together we step out into the unknown with nothing to guide us but a hand just beyond our grasp. Thanks be to God, Amen.
