A letter of Encouragement from the Presbytery Chairperson September 2022

Hello friends, fellow travellers in this journey of faith that we share,

I confess that I have always struggled with the concept of hope. What does it mean for Christians to hope? It is more than wishing, I know that much, it is deeper than wishing, but what is it?

Last week, as Don and I travelled from our home in Nagambie to The Rock, near Wagga, it became a little clearer in my mind. The signs of Spring were everywhere. Wattle was in full bloom. Paddocks of Canola were laid out bright amongst the dark green of other crops. There were newborn lambs and magpies in territorial stand-off. Life was stirring after what has seemed a long winter. The change of the season speaks of hope - the promise of things to come.

When we are in the depths of winter spring seems far away, but we know it will come, we trust it will come. If you are a farmer, you bank on it. Planting seed in the autumn when the world is going down to winter darkness. Waiting on rain. Waiting for warmth. Breathing a little more easily at the first signs of spring. Never counting on anything until the grain is in the silo, but trusting, despite the setbacks and failures, that in their time the seasons will turn. Farming is a long game and that is how it is with faith - a long game, a generational game, played in good seasons and poor, trusting to God the part of the game we will not see.

This past week some of us read the parable of the mustard seed in Luke's gospel. Jesus' point is that the kingdom of God is like a tiny mustard seed, from the same family as Canola, and that in this kingdom, little things planted can grow big results. From little things big things grow. That transports me straight to Kev Carmody and Paul Kelly's song of the same name. A song that talks about the stand of the Gurindji people of the Northern Territory who in the 1960's sat down for seven years, asking not just to be paid for work done, but for connection to their cultural lands from which their life flowed. It would be helpful to listen to that song. It illustrates what I am talking about.

For a long time we have thought about mission as converting people to our way of thinking. I want to ask you to reconsider. To work with the idea that the kingdom belongs to God and that it is God who is at mission inside the church and outside it, inviting us to play a supporting role. If you think about mission in this way, what happened amongst the Gurindji and all that has followed is an example of God at work, God at mission. It is what Jesus was talking about with the mustard seed. God plants and plays a long game and God's kingdom comes in every act of dignity restored, every wrong righted, every relationship healed.

In the next few years, we are going to be asked to make some changes, to enter treaties and to alter the Australian constitution to further, formally, recognise the place of indigenous people. I want to ask you to look at those changes as God at work, inviting us to play a supporting role and in the process, getting our relationship with God and with those around us, in good order. It is through our actions and in our relationships that God is known amongst us. This is our mission.
