AN EARLY WORD

TiS 412 God sends us his Spirit

Bible Readings: Lamentations 3:19-26 Luke 17:5-10

Reflection

The lectionary has presented us with some challenging readings in recent weeks and today is no exception. What are we to make of this interaction of Jesus with his disciples in the Luke reading we just heard.

One could almost start feeling a little sorry for these disciples because Jesus has been asking some fairly extraordinary things of them - to give away their possessions, to forgive those who wrong them...many times, to take up his cross, and more. No wonder then, that they ask for more faith. They feel inadequate to the tasks around them, insufficient to the challenges, unable to imagine accomplishing any of what he is asking. And I guess in our own day, when things both locally and internationally feel a little bit out of control, we may feel the same. We may feel as if we need more faith.

In the gospel something interesting happens. When the disciples recognize their need and ask Jesus for help, for more faith, you'd think he would both welcome and grant their request. But he doesn't. Instead, he almost seems to rebuke them. "If you had even a speck of faith...," he begins, implying that they actually don't have faith even the size of a mustard seed. It's not the expected response to the disciples' earnest question.

But what if the question the disciples ask isn't only earnest and heartfelt, but also problematic, even a little miscued. Maybe Jesus' sharp retort was just what they needed— to orient them to the miraculous presence of God all around them and the totally-sufficient faith they already have.

In the second part of this short reading there is a reference to servants. How do we interpret these words of Jesus? Perhaps Jesus is saying something like this: Servants have a job to do, and they are expected to do it well. Generally they are not invited to eat at the table with their master – they eat when their work is done. Nor do they deserve great thanks simply for doing their job; they just do it. So is Jesus saying here: That's what faith is like.... Faith is simply the willingness to do what needs to be done. Faith is not, in other words, some kind of scarce resource that needs to be accumulated, spent, or added to. Faith isn't always heroic - indeed, it usually isn't - but instead is simply and humbly doing what needs to be done, big or small, great or mundane, just because it needs doing.



This isn't the first time in Luke's gospel that Jesus has celebrated the ordinariness of faith in his encounters with people. He has already named as faithful a desperate woman who simply believes that touching his cloak will bring healing; a centurion's concern for a sick servant; and a woman's gratitude at being forgiven. Soon in this same gospel he will also call faithful a Samaritan leper who returns to thank him for healing, and the plea of a blind beggar for sight. So perhaps it isn't so surprising that Jesus would challenge the disciples' perception about faith by pointing them to the very ordinary hard work and service of a servant performing his duties. Faith is found not in the mighty acts of heaven but in the ordinary and everyday acts of doing what needs to be done, responding to the needs around us, and caring for the people who come our way.

Faith is – turning up for work and doing a good job.

listening when someone needs to talk. volunteering at an opp shop or helping the homeless writing a thank you note to someone who has shown kindness cooking a meal for a distressed family or friend.

praying for a neighbour who is having a hard time.

The list could go on - and you'll note that none of these actions is a big deal. Yet it's actions such as these that occupy much of our lives. And they are acts of faith. Somehow, an "act of faith" seems like it needs to be significant or costly or even extravagant to merit God's attention. But no – in actual fact we are living out acts of faith every day. We have sufficient faith – and we use it wherever we are to make a difference however small or large.

You may have noted in last week's church NEWS that the Uniting Church Assembly has suggested acknowledging Older Person Sunday in October. This fits in rather nicely with today's reflections because where would we be without the daily faithful contribution of older people to the life of this congregation??

Our Uniting Church president, Sharon Hollis, has offered the following as an introduction to Older Persons Sunday:

"The Uniting Church's life is enriched by its many older members who remember faithfully and watch hopefully for where God is leading, speak out on issues of injustice and nurture and encourage others across the generations. We give thanks for their worship, witness and service.

More broadly, as a society we are gifted by the many contributions, diverse experiences and loving care we receive from the older Australians in our lives. In the Uniting Church, we believe all people should be treated with respect and dignity."

The disciples plead with Jesus to give them more faith. Jesus' response? You have enough faith, use it well. "Faithfulness" is simply doing what we see needs to be done. Faith doesn't have to be heroic – like going to another country to serve as a doctor or missionary. Faith is being attentive to the needs around us and committing ourselves to doing what we can with what we've got, trusting that God will make use of it. You, the members of this congregation are very good at doing this. Well done good and faithful servants, Amen.
