GREETINGS FROM KERRIE

Hello,

Have you ever looked at an ordinary, everyday object that you use occasionally – and suddenly discovered how beautifully made it is; how clever the person who designed and fabricated it is?

I had that feeling today as I received a set of three stencils in the mail. They were made to line up and create the perfect image in three steps. They were also designed to work as sets of two, or to be used alone. The person who designed them also embossed the stencils on the front side, so that the user would never mistakenly turn a stencil the wrong way round. They could be lined up perfectly. All that work for a few little pieces of plastic, yet these little pieces of plastic could make an artistic statement...and also enhance the work of a dabbling crafter (me).

There are so many little things in this world we could take for granted, but the blessing comes in recognising the work, the thought, the planning, the technical know-how...just out of the blue.

And a kind of revelation comes in recognising that sometimes things of the past might stand up better to scrutiny than things built on a similar design today. Take the humble old rotary eggbeater for instance — a better whisk. If you have one from around the 1940's or 50's you have a treasure, but if it was from the seventies or eighties, you've probably moved on quickly to the stick blenders around now. Plastics and angled handle designs kind of made the eggbeater unwieldy and the opportunity for another reinvention occurred. Pick up that stick blender and you can now have whipped cream in a couple of minutes, and butter almost before you know it...and no wrist pain at all. Unless the power goes out.

We use the ingenuity of people in our everyday lives and don't realise it. Because we're used to it. And it takes those moments of clarity - of exploration to see the beauty behind it.

I wonder- when was the last time we picked up a leaf and looked at it? Or a flower? Or sat in a park and looked at a tree? Or looked up at the stars at

night? If we're being honest, I'd say it was way more often than when we recognise the hard work of other people.

So next time you are fascinated by a clever tool – why not join me in remembering and giving thanks that the one who created the stars, the vegetation and all, is the one who created amazing, creative, industrious people able to make a difference in the world.
